US Should Promote Justice for Rohingya

On September 24, 2018, the US State Department issued a report documenting Burmese security force atrocities against the Rohingya, including murder, rape, and mass arson. The report determined that the violence was "extreme, large-scale, widespread," but did not recommend action nor conclude that the abuses amounted to crimes against humanity or genocide.

The State Department report should be the catalyst for the US and other UN members to take broader action for holding those who committed grave crimes in Burma accountable.
