



Nourishing a Local Food Culture, Thanks to YOU!



Inspiring Others: As a nationally recognized food systems innovator, we have welcomed visitors from North Carolina to Hawaii, Ontario and New York seeking to bring the "Intervale magic" to their own communities. In September 2014, Maggie, our Beginning Farmer Specialist, attended a week-long intensive in Portland, Oregon, as part of the National Incubator Farm Training Initiative (NIFTI). Here's an excerpt from her letter home:


"As I sit on the train heading north from Portland to Seattle, I realize I am really far from home. But the feeling hadn't hit me until this moment. Although I've been 2,000 miles from the Intervale, where 26 years ago Will Raap envisioned a new form of agriculture that could be collaborative and restorative, I felt close to home and surrounded by friends. Having the opportunity to see projects all over the country that are modeled after the Intervale Center is deeply inspiring. Literally hundreds of organizations are replicating our work!"

Growing the Market for Local Food: We continue to break down barriers for Vermont farmers and food producers bringing their products to market, and we are working hard to ensure that fresh, delicious, healthy local food is available to anyone who wants it.

In 2014, the Intervale Food Hub delivered food to 1,200 customers in Chittenden County. In addition, our unique partnership with food-service provider Sodexo will create a new market for the Food Hub's 45 farm partners and make it easier for college students to cook and eat farm-fresh food.



Finally, we led a major research project with the Farm to Plate Network, University of Vermont's Center for Rural Studies, and Vermont Retail and Grocers Association investigating the opportunities for getting more local food into Vermont's independent grocery stores – a \$750 million market.

Thank you for protecting Vermont's water and land for future generations.

Modeling Farming in the Face of Climate Change

In 2014, we began work on long-term planning to support our own resilience in the face of climate change, as we model successful floodplain farming to other communities and share our findings nationally and locally. Last summer, we assessed flood risk on 41 tillable parcels of land and surveyed Intervale farmers and other land users. Intervale farmers reported that farming is challenging everywhere in Vermont and that the Intervale has many positive attributes - great soil, a location right in Vermont's largest city, and a supportive community of like-minded growers - that are hard to find elsewhere. They overwhelmingly agreed that the benefits of farming in the Intervale continue to outweigh the risk of flooding.

Over the next several years, we'll be implementing integrated land management strategies to ensure a healthy ecosystem, a vibrant environment for farming, and a safe and fun place for community members to eat, work and play.



In 2014, our Intervale Conservation Nursery contributed over 20,000 trees and shrubs to riparian reforestation projects across Vermont. That's over 100 acres of riparian buffers restored in watersheds from Williston to Randolph. These buffers filter pollutants from our waterways, provide native habitat for birds, insects and other wildlife, and sequester carbon to help mitigate climate change. In addition, we removed 24,500 plastic tree tubes (used to protect young trees) from Addison and neighboring counties – that's two tons of plastic removed from our working landscape!

One incredible partnership that grew this year was with Vermont Works for Women's Transitional Jobs program. Over two sessions, a total of 12 women worked for eight weeks at the Nursery, providing daily support for diverse tasks. One participant said of her experience, "I loved working outside. Every day I learned something new. Always looked forward to what we were going to do next. I think it was an awesome life-changing experience. I now appreciate nature in a whole new light."



Thank you for helping us lead the growing community food revolution.

Through participation in local, regional and national networks, such as Vermont Farm to Plate and the New England Food Summit, we are sharing our expertise and leveraging our unique approach for positive change on a broader scale. In September, we hosted USDA Deputy Secretary, Krysta Harden, where she announced RBEG and RBOG grants, and, in partnership with Vermont Housing and Conservation Board, members of the National Association of State Departments of Agriculture, with whom we shared the Intervale as a model of community-based agriculture. Travis was proud to be the keynote speaker at the Vermont Land Trust's Annual Meeting at Health Hero Farm in South Hero and at the U.S. Agricultural Information Network's annual conference.

Thank you for ensuring that all Vermonters have a

place at the table.



Thanks to your support, our Intervale Gleaning and Food Rescue program doubled in size, providing free food shares to 125 households and 12 organizations and distributing 29,000 pounds of fresh food to people in need. Currently, about 13% of Vermonters don't have enough to eat; at the Intervale Center, we ensure that our hungry neighbors can participate in the local food movement. We partnered with farms based in the Intervale and further afield in Chittenden County, as well as eight farms at the Saturday Burlington Farmers' Market, to bring participants a wide assortment of fresh produce each week. As Nancy, a Free Food Share recipient, said, "I cannot tell you what a difference this program makes for me. I have learned how to prepare new foods. I can better budget my weekly food allowance, and I am able to eat a healthier diet. Thank you so much. I look forward to this every week."





Intervale Center 2014


