

SPECIAL REPORT: Helping People Survive the Global Refugee Crisis

Once, they were doctors, lawyers, small business owners. Today, their families live in tents without clean running water or electricity. Some have been displaced within their own country. Others are refugees, forced to leave their homes to make a new life in a strange land.

Torn from their homes because of violence and conflict, more than **60 million displaced people and refugees live on the edge of survival**. Most heartbreaking of all is the fact that half of the world's refugees are children. Many will grow up without a home, education, safety or emotional support ... unless we help them.



Children are among the most vulnerable refugees – and they need your help.

June 20 is **World Refugee Day**, a time to recognize the daily hardships facing men, women and children who often lack the basics – food, clean water, safe shelter – in a place they can't call home. Mercy Corps acknowledges the millions of refugees and displaced ... whose normal, stable lives have been shattered and turned into chaos. Individuals, community groups and

organizations around the world will help bring attention and awareness to the enormous challenges facing refugees like these ...

In Syria, families have endured more than five years of violent conflict. More than 11 million people – half the country's pre-war population – have either died or been forced from their homes.

Jordan, the second-most water-poor country in the world, is host to more than 600,000 Syrian refugees. Many spend hours standing in line for water, and the large population of refugees continues to strain resources.

In Lebanon, refugees often live in makeshift tent camps they've built themselves, or in abandoned buildings

or cowsheds. One in every five people in Lebanon is now a refugee.

While a huge number of the world's refugees have fled the war in Syria, there are millions of people around the world who have also been forced from their homes due to natural disaster or conflict.

The young country of **South Sudan** is in the grips of a massive crisis. More than 1.6 million people are displaced within its borders, and another 755,000 have fled to neighboring countries.

The Central African Republic has been trapped in a cycle of conflict for years. There are 438,000 displaced people in this country and most live in overcrowded and unsanitary displacement camps.

In the Democratic Republic of Congo, the desperate need for clean, safe water is one of the biggest daily

Justine and her husband Antoine are struggling to keep their young children safe, healthy and educated in Goma, eastern Congo's largest city. Like so many others in Goma, they fled roaming armed groups and live in a displacement camp built on jagged lava rock. Their one-room wooden shack houses the entire family.



Justine and her family have one less thing to worry about, now that a Mercy Corps tap stand is right near their home.

Justine had been walking for miles to fill cans with dirty water so they could cook, clean and drink. Every single day she risked being attacked by bandits on the long journey, which she often had to start in the early morning darkness.

"Water is life," Justine says. "There is nothing we can do without water."

That's why, with your help, Mercy Corps has been working to repair, improve and expand Goma's water network, so that life's most vital necessity is safe and available to everyone. Today, an intricate system of pipes, pumps and reservoirs brings clean water to tap stands throughout the city – and to a stand across from Justine's home.

Now, instead of walking hours carrying a 40-pound can of water – and repeating that backbreaking journey multiple times a day – Justine walks only a few dozen yards to collect clean water

for her beloved family.

"Now we are feeling very good," Justine says. "We have reduced the distance and time that we were spending searching for water. It is very important to us." With the arrival of clean water, Justine now has hope that things can change for the better in a place that is too often surrounded by suffering.


UPDATE: Fighting Hunger in Ethiopia

A Reason to Hope How you help children reclaim their future

rom Syria to Colombia to South Sudan, boys and girls are being robbed of their chance for a bright future. They're never sure if they'll have a meal or shelter. They get sick, withdraw or feel despair. Boys and girls are vulnerable to recruitment as child soldiers, and many girls give birth too young, risking lifelong damage to mother and baby.

For young people facing the world's toughest challenges, their future begins with you. With your support, we're helping them receive an education, reconnect with friends and trusted adults, and rediscover hope.

Here are just three examples of how your support is helping children in crisis build a better future.

Colombian teenagers are at risk. You're their lifeline.

Putumayo, Colombia is a dangerous place to be a child. Domestic abuse, sexual assault and recruitment into armed groups happen all the time.



Carmen engages children in healthy activities that keep them safe from harm.

That's why many parents – like 13-year-old Lucia's* – send their children to rural boarding schools. Still, the children get little support from adults outside of class time.

"I want to give them a vision that they can overcome the situation that they're in." – Carmen, a caregiver

With your help, we're bringing in caregivers like Carmen to provide full-time supervision for at-risk youth like Lucia. Carmen teaches life-skills like hygiene and sexual education. She helps the children learn about ways to protect themselves from armed groups, child labor and gender-based violence. And the children love it when she schedules healthy educational activities – yoga, games, singing, dancing.

The volatility that surrounds these children can cause behavior problems, lapses in education, and despair – but it doesn't have to. Through this intervention, you're helping us reach 46,500 children just like Lucia, to help them build a future free of violence.

6,000 students receive eye exams

Omar, who lives in the Za'atari refugee camp in Jordan, used to sit in the first row in his classroom – not only because he loves to learn, but also because he couldn't see what was written on the board.

But this year, Omar is one of 6,000 students who have been prescreened for vision problems. And because of his new prescription glasses, he can sit anywhere he wants in the classroom – and his notes will be complete.

With your help, we're making sure that every student in need in the Za'atari and Azraq refugee camps will have corrective glasses by 2017. And what does this mean for the children?

Feeding the future in Lebanon

Before Mommy Made's food deliveries, 4-year-old Najya went most days at kindergarten without any lunch at all. Missing meals is a stark, daily reality for many refugees in Lebanon.

That's why, earlier this year, we partnered with Mommy Made and Arab Salim Women's Cooperative to fill the bellies of students at three impoverished schools in Lebanon.

"They're energetic. They're happier. They're how kids should be. Not hungry." – Lynn, Mommy Made's dietician

The guarantee of a balanced meal increased students' attendance and encouraged parents to choose education over child labor as they saw their household food costs decrease.

Thanks to your support, we provided over 37,000 lunches to thousands of young students in Lebanon, giving them the fuel they needed to learn, grow and succeed.

Refugee and low-income students received healthy bag lunches through our lunch delivery program.
