Dear Pamela,

Mercy Corps is on the ground in Haiti, assessing Hurricane Matthew's damage and preparing to respond to the needs of the country's most vulnerable people, who will need our help to rebuild their lives in the months ahead.

Hurricane Matthew has passed over the island, and only now is the damage of the storm starting to become clear. The powerful Category 4 hurricane caused widespread destruction — it destroyed homes, flooded streets and decimated crops. According to the U.N., as many as 350,000 people are now in need of assistance.

The southern part of the island was hit especially hard, and the bridge that connects it to the rest of the country was completely washed out by the storm, making access and delivery of supplies even more complicated.

"The people here have just been pushed down by one thing after another," Jessica Pearl, Mercy Corps' Country Director in Haiti, told The New York Times this week. This hurricane has the potential to be a major setback for a country that is still recovering from the massive earthquake in 2010, but Pearl and the Mercy Corps team are working hard to prevent that. Thanks to the support of the Mercy Corps community, our team in Haiti will provide financial assistance to families with destroyed or damaged homes, and help farmers recover from lost crops and livestock. When we are able to access the southern peninsula, we expect to also provide emergency supplies like clean water, and help repair damaged shelters.

This is only the beginning. "We still don't know how many people have lost their homes; the hardest-hit areas are still tough to access," said Pearl. "And we are very concerned that many families do not have access to clean drinking water, which greatly increases the risk of cholera."

The people of Haiti will need our help for the long term to get back on their feet. Most people rely on subsistence farming to earn a living, and the storm has taken a severe toll on farmers. In one region, approximately 80 percent of the banana crops were destroyed by winds and flooding — these crops supported some 20,000 families.
