Dear Ms. Grow,

Half of the planet's wildlife has disappeared in our lifetime. Here, in our own province, more than 200 plant and animal species are at risk of becoming extinct.

STOP!

We can do something about it. In fact, you already are. And together, we can—and must—do more. Today, I'm sharing with you an action update to show you exactly what we're doing to save wild species you love and what more needs to be done.

As you know, Ontario Nature is suing the Province of Ontario. We have argued that the Provincial government unlawfully gutted our gold-standard Endangered Species Act. Its regulatory changes, made in 2013, dramatically weakened protection for at-risk wildlife. Our lawsuit is before Ontario's Divisional Court.

2015 is also an important year for three crucial wild spaces. The Greenbelt, Oak Ridges Moraine and Niagara Escarpment conservation plans are being reviewed by the government. And as the voice for nature in Ontario, we're involved in every step of the process, ensuring government protects these critical areas in the face of enormous pressure.

NOW WHAT?

To get the policy changes we need for our endangered species, we must work within our justice and political systems. This work can be agonizingly slow, and it can be hard to see and feel immediate changes, but securing legislative protections is a critical part of our work to protect nature in Ontario.

WHAT ABOUT IN MY BACKYARD?



Inspiring Action: Youth Council Responds to Pollinator Crisis

Pollinators are responsible for one in every three bites of food that we eat. They are critical to our ecosystems, ensuring the reproductive success of plants and the survival of wildlife that depend on those plants for food and shelter. The rusty-patched bumblebee was a common species in the 1970s and is now listed as endangered.

Citizen Science: Our Boots in the Bog

Six years ago, citizen scientists from all over Ontario began submitting their observations to our Reptile and Amphibian Atlas. Data collected by nature lovers like you show that the spotted salamander is now only found in 55% of its former range. This is particularly troubling because this species only travels one kilometre in its whole life—from wetlands to grasslands, and because salamanders are an "indicator species", which means that their well being tells us about the overall health of our ecosystem.

With your support today, Ontario Nature can encourage more citizen scientists to get involved in our Reptile and Amphibian Atlas. \$75 funds the work to survey 100 square kilometres of spotted salamander habitat, recording and monitoring population changes to inform conservation action.



Greenway Program: Protecting Habitats of Vulnerable Species

Red-headed woodpeckers were once common in southern Ontario. Scrappy, loud and bold, they live in open woodland and nest in dead trees. Their population has declined by more than 60% in the last 20 years. And the cause? Habitat loss. Here in southern Ontario, we have lost more than 70% of our wetlands, 98% of our original grasslands and 80% of our forests. Our Greenway program is a major conservation initiative to reverse this loss by protecting ecologically significant habitat cores and the corridors that connect them across southern and eastern Ontario.
