2015 Victories For Nature: Thanks To You!

Your Ontario Nature membership provides vital support so that we can be the voice for nature in our province. Here is just some of what we accomplished, together!

Your Honour, We Certainly Will Appeal!

We are fighting a provincial regulation that allows industrial activities to be exempt from the Endangered Species Act (ESA), essentially allowing them to kill species at risk and destroy their habitat. This is the first time environmental groups have won the right to appeal decisions around the ESA. Thank you for standing with us—and species we love—in court! Your renewed support today will help with our appeal in 2016.

Fighting for Our Woodland Caribou

Ontario has already lost 40–50% of our historic distribution of boreal woodland caribou. Only 2 ranges of 13 in Ontario are classified as "sufficient to sustain" the populations of these iconic and beloved creatures. Until our province stops threats to woodland caribou habitat and gets serious about recovery measures, the long-term survival of this species is in jeopardy. We continue to insist on real, enhanced protection for endangered species on almost 14 million hectares of boreal forest.

Passionate Youth Council Inspires Action!

Our Youth Council played a leadership role in convincing the provincial government to restrict the use of neonicotinoids, a group of pesticides known to be harmful to pollinators, including bees and butterflies. Our creative young people also released 2 fantastic videos highlighting pollinator conservation initiatives.

Our home had a big, beautiful tree in the backyard and I remember once when I was very sick in bed, I had this perfect view of our tree. And it was completely full of warblers, I couldn't believe my eyes! When I saw a blackburnian warbler I thought I was hallucinating, it was so colourful and gorgeous.

I'm delighted that Phoebe's love for nature grew like mine. As soon as I saw her, we embraced immediately and started sharing memories and new stories too.

Action: I'm devoted to my native garden. I've planted wildflowers and ferns and created a lovely little habitat for local wildlife. And I'm proud of it too!

Hope for Tomorrow: It breaks my heart to see our appalling loss of habitat. Our constant expansion without regard for wildlife is an

absolute tragedy. I have a wonderful dream where everyone values the preservation of nature and we are inspired to protect it.
